Themes/Questions Emerging from Public Input to City Council

1. Call for service/dispatch

- The 911 recording indicates that the caller said that she thought a young man may have shot himself. The dispatch was for shots fired.
- Many members of the public believe that Ms. Lewis was the victim of a domestic dispute and that dispute triggered the 911 call.
- o What did the officers reasonably know when they arrived on the scene?

2. De-escalation

- o Why was physical contact initiated instead of using de-escalation techniques?
- Why weren't de-escalation techniques used? [The public does not understand that some of the tactics used prior to physical contact actually were de-escalation.]

3. Use of rifles

- o Why were rifles used?
- O Why didn't Officer Ruff get rid of the rifle before dealing with Ms. Lewis since it was flopping around and hitting her in the back?

4. Patronizing/racist/sexist language

The choice of words with Ms. Lewis (e.g., "Act like a lady." And repeating her vernacular: "I'm fittin' to go home.") is considered by some to be offensive.

5. Excessive use of force

- O Why did three officers take Ms. Lewis down?
- o Why did the officers punch her, knee her in the back, etc.
- o Why did Officer Ruff lift her hands in the air, allegedly causing her pain?
- O Why did the officers hobble her? Use a spit hood on her?

6. Possible armed subject

If the officers were concerned that Ms. Lewis may have had a weapon, why did Sergeant
Cervantes come out from behind the car to put hands on her?

7. Administrative Leave

Members of the public question why the three police officers involved in the Aleyah Lewis arrest were not put on administrative leave for some period of time. A City Council member offered up an arbitrary two weeks? Until the investigation of the incident is complete?

8. Release of Body Camera/Squad Car Camera Footage (not enough)

O Why hasn't the Police Department released all of the body camera/squad car camera footage associated with the Aleyah Lewis arrest?

9. Release of Body Camera/Squad Car Camera Footage (too much)

Why did the Police Department release the body camera/squad car camera footage of the Aleyah Lewis arrest and subsequent jail interview the following day? Isn't that a violation of her 5th Amendment rights?

ADDITIONAL BACKGROUND CONCERNS NOT DIRECTLY RELATED TO THE APRIL 10TH INCIDENT. FOR GENERAL INFORMATION ONLY.

- Information requested about the group being selected to perform the Independent Investigation/Review of the arrest of Aleyah Lewis. Concern expressed that neither the City Council nor the public was allowed to participate in the selection of the firm.
- Demands for State's Attorney Julia Rietz to drop the charges brought against Aleyah Lewis. Concerns expressed as to why the Mayor/Council haven't recommended that the charges be dropped. (At least one Council member has asked individually for the charges to be dropped.)
- Urbana Police Department and City Staff obstruction of the Civilian Police Review Board complaint review process.
- Urbana Police Department failure to respond to complaints in the timeframe set forth in City Code.
- Address the lack of civilian oversight of the Urbana Police Department and the lack of accountability of the police to the residents of Urbana.
- Reform/redesign/expand the Civilian Police Review Board. Change from a review model to an investigative model.
- Make police complaints more accessible, transparent, and open to the public.
- Address the lack of transparency within the Urbana Police Department as an organization.
- Review and change Urbana Police Department policies dealing with use of force (last resort), chokeholds, and other uses of violence.
- Adopt the NAACP 10 shared principles.
- Join the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police Illinois Law Enforcement Accreditation Program.
- Demilitarize the Urbana Police Department and prohibit future purchases of military style equipment and vehicles.
- Retrain and require de-escalation techniques be used by Urbana police officers.
- Reallocate funds from the police budget to address community issues such as education, mental health, substance abuse, affordable housing, and job creation.
- Concern about delays in answering FOIA requests and excessive fees associated with these requests.
